

Perhaps the Old Testament is so full of instructions as to how to worship in a way pleasing to God, because He knows how forgetful we can be! A poster outside a church read


'Problem of ancient times: IDOL worship Problem of modern times: IDLE worship'

The Psalmist wrote in psalm 95: 6 'Come, let us bow down in worship, let us kneel before the Lord our Maker.'

He knew that the habit or practice of coming before God helps us to remember that God is so mighty, is faithful and is forgiving. We need to worship.

We need to worship because without it we can easily forget that we have a great Big God beside us and we will live in fear.

We need worship because without it we forget His calling and live in a spirit of self preoccupation.



We need to worship because without we lose a sense of wonder and gratitude and plod along with blinkers on.

We need to worship because we encourage each other and ride life's storms together, without that shared experience of worship we become isolated and cold like an ember that falls from the fire will grow cold.

We need to worship because of our natural tendency to self reliance and stubborn independence.

Good Friday Walk of Witness

This Good Friday April 3rd we will be remembering Jesus' Passion in both St Nicholas and St Michael's Churches with a walk of witness. There will be a half hour service at St Michael's Church in Shotwick at 2pm and those who would like to will then walk across the fields to St. Nicholas Church in Burton

There will be refreshments at St. Nicholas for those who will travel by car instead of walking from 3.15pm and then another half hour service at 4pm.

All ages are welcome to join us but please don't worry if walking isn't for you! There will be quite a few who will be going between the churches by car.



Using Astronomy to Date The Crucifixion

The Bible does not give us the exact date of Christ's crucifixion, or even enough indirect information to pin it down with certainty. However, the crucifixion coincided with a partial eclipse of the Moon, and this helps us decide on the most likely date.

The only certainty about the date of the crucifixion in the Bible is that took place during the ten years that Pontius Pilate was in charge of Judea. This was from A.D. 26 to 36.

There is a complication in trying to date biblical events. Our months and days do not coincide with those of the Jewish calendar, which is implicit in the information given in the Gospels. Jewish days start and end at 6pm in the evening, and Jewish months straddle our months.

All the Gospels agree that Jesus died a few hours before start of the Jewish Sabbath. This commences at 6pm on a Friday evening. The Gospels agree to within a day that it was the time of the Passover - the annual Jewish feast held at the time of a full Moon. Newton's Laws of Motion allow us to calculate when the Moon is full - not forgetting of course that it is a full Moon as viewed from Jerusalem that is needed.

Passover time was precisely specified in the official Judean calendar. It took place on the 14th day of the Jewish month that straddles our March and April. The


Passover meal had to begin at moonrise that evening. Again Newton's Laws allow calculation of the time of moonrise (as viewed from Jerusalem).

It is recorded in the so-called "Report to Pilate" (a documentary fragment from the New Testament Apocrypha) that at Christ's crucifixion "The moon appeared like blood." The phrase "the moon appeared like blood" almost certainly refers to an eclipse of the moon.

For an eclipse of the moon, the Earth comes in between the moon and the sun, and so casts a shadow on the full moon. The reason the moon is red is easy to explain. Although in the Earth's shadow, some sunlight still reaches the moon by being refracted (or bent) by the Earth's atmosphere (just like light in a prism). While travelling through the Earth's atmosphere all the colours that make up white light (the rainbow) except red are easily scattered by the gasses and dust in the air. So it is mostly red light that travels on to illuminate the Moon.

Newton's Laws can be used to calculate to a few seconds the times of all past lunar eclipses. In the period AD26 to 36 there was only one lunar eclipse at Passover time visible from Jerusalem. The date referred to our calendar is **Friday 3 April AD33**.

On that day moonrise did not occur until 6.20pm, just after the start of the Sabbath when the Passover feast



was to start. The moon would have appeared with about 20% of its disc eclipsed. It would have been observed my most of the population of Israel, since the Jews on Passover day would have been looking for sunset to signal the start of the Sabbath, and Moonrise to signal the start of the Passover meal. Instead of seeing the expected full "paschal moon" they would have seen a full Moon with a large red crescent superimposed upon it. The effect would have been very dramatic.

Finally, it is interesting to note that the Last Supper could not have been a Passover meal, and this may lie at the heart of the difference in the Gospels as to the actual day of the crucifixion.



March Brings Breezes Loud & Shrill...

Taving survived the cold snap, hopefully the Ispring bulbs will burst into a blaze of colour both in the garden and various tubs and pots. Harry Lauder's Walking Stick (twisted hazel) has masses of catkins which are lovely in flower arrangements. The Buddelia Davidii which had one-third of growth taken off prior to the winter have now been pruned hard back. Their florets are a haven for bees and butterflies in the summer. Of course, top of the agenda is seed sowing and the first seeds to be sown are the Sweet Peas. The varieties chosen this year are White Frills, Zillah Harrod, John Adie etc. These will be sown on or around the 16th March. Before that the greenhouse needs a further cleaning and a good sort out. Seed sowing is quite easy; it is the pricking out of the seedlings which takes most of my time, so most of my time will be spent in the greenhouse. Hebe seedlings were planted in various parts of the garden and these seem to be thriving. Some new roses will be planted this year but the variety is yet to be decided.

The fieldfare only appeared in the garden to feast on apples when it was cold. A few blackbirds appeared and masses of sparrows. Only one blue and one great tit but four long tailed tits visited occasionally. Jenny Wren is a frequent visitor and of course Robbie Robin visits daily (especially around breakfast time!)




