The Vicar Writes - A Message from Cathy & Steve Helm ...





Trust can only really be expressed when we find ourselves in a situation in which we have to place our trust in something, someone or even ourselves.

As many of you know, as a family, we recently had to put our trust in the emergency services, the skill of some very kind friends and, of course, in the power of prayer. When Steve had a bleed on the brain after going into the vestry during a funeral, it was a huge shock, but we have been so thankful for the care and support of so many people, some we knew well and others we had never met before.

We trusted the skill and experience of our amazing paramedics and NHS staff, which I have seen in operation so many times, but to be on the receiving end has increased our thankfulness for them.

The adverts about strokes do work, as Steve knew that's what he'd had, even though he couldn't communicate it to those who found him on the vestry floor. He tried to write FAST [Face, Arms, Speech, Time] and then 999 on the new vestry floor which he discovered is 'non-marking'!

It was at that point in his own words:



What's the most practical thing I can do now? Pray. It's me Lord. Help! Sorry I've been messing about. It's over to you now.

And he did pray, along with others who were there watching on in concern. I have written about prayer many times and the importance of holding situations, people and loved ones in prayer.

Throughout the events of that afternoon, Steve was calm and so well cared for. That was the start of seeing prayers answered in an amazing way.

The staff in the stroke ward were so kind, especially the nurse who quietly whispered "An answer to prayer" to which Steve replied:



I know. I just had to trust Him.

Steve has written about his experience and has listed the things he's learned:

- Next time I'll just sit quietly at the back of church during a funeral.
- 2. Life never goes as we expect it to.
- 3. There are a lot of good people around.
- 4. I know that I can trust God in all circumstances.

It has taken us back to the verse from Proverbs 3 which I wrote about last year.

Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and lean not on your own understanding.

In all your ways acknowledge Him and He will make your paths straight. 15&61

We are so grateful for prayers answered. We are thankful for the gift of time together, a very caring community, excellent medical care and an ever deepening trust in God.

with the 2018 financial report and accounts.


The Treasurer explained that whilst the church's income for last year had exceeded expenditure, church finances remained finely balanced. Only by reducing the amount paid by the parish to the Diocese for ministry and other costs had it been possible to balance the books. This means that whilst the amount paid to the Diocese equates to that of a standard parish, the figure falls short of the amount requested of Burton (as a more affluent parish) by the Diocese. On an annual basis, the shortfall is in excess of £18,000.

Notwithstanding the delicate nature of church finances, the PCC is most grateful to all those who contribute so generously to church finances through Planned Giving, or by making single-sum donations or by contributing via the Friends of St Nicholas' Church.

'All Stars' are also pleased to be able to meet again in the new room during the Sunday services after having to take a break while the Vestry work was underway and off limits. The new Vestry is just perfect. It creates a lovely modern, light space which will make such a difference for all those involved in the Youth Work.



On Monday 20 May Mothers' Union members met in church for their 'slot' in the international 'Wave of Prayer'.

The 'Wave of Prayer' is a continuous expression of commitment in prayer by MU members to each other. It runs throughout the year so that the work of MU as well as members of each area in which MU is active, is prayed for at some point.



The choir has been an integral part of the musical life of Gateshead and the North East of England since its formation in 1920. Performing around 15 to 20 times a year the choir travels extensively both at home and abroad. It also has a good record in international competitions with several first prizes.

Felling Male Voice Choir has regularly been in the forefront of commissions from eminent composers and arrangers. Programmes typically include arrangements of well known 'show stoppers', some imaginative contemporary pieces as well as the more mainstream male voice choir repertoire including traditional local songs, opera, operetta and spirituals.

The choir is active in fostering links with schools and youth choirs in joint ventures, believing that encouraging young people to sing is vital in securing the choir's long term future. The choir has also made several CDs over the years.

A Time for Prayer and Reflection from Acension to Pentecost ...

Thy Kingdom Come 2019

The Archbishops of Canterbury and York, along with leaders from all the main denominations, have called for a season of prayer between Ascension Day and Pentecost, praying specifically for people to come to know Christ.

Thousands of churches across the UK and beyond have joined in this initiative, called Thy Kingdom Come.

During the 11 days of Thy Kingdom Come, it is hoped that as many people as possible will take part in order to:

- Deepen their relationship with Jesus Christ
- Pray for God's spirit to work in the lives of those they know
- Come to realise that every aspect of their life is the stuff of prayer

After the very first Ascension Day the disciples gathered. They devoted themselves to prayer while they waited for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. Like them, our reliance on the gift of the Holy Spirit is total – on our own we can do nothing.

Throughout the centuries Christians have gathered to pray for the coming of the Holy Spirit. Thy Kingdom Come picks up this tradition.

Over the past three years more and more worshipping communities have dedicated the days between Ascension and Pentecost to join in and pray 'Come Holy Spirit'.



This year St Nicholas' Church will join in by having a half hour of prayer every evening from 7.00 to 7.30pm. from Thursday 30 May through to Saturday 8 June. (NB Sunday 3 June is an Evensong service at 6.30pm as usual).

There is a set Evening or Night prayer and each night will be led by someone different. So, you can come and sit quietly or join in as you feel comfortable but do come and join this special time of prayer.

Ascension Day

Ascension Day celebrates Jesus's ascension to heaven after he was resurrected on Easter Day.

Pentecost

Pentecost marks fifty days since Easter Day and brings the Easter season to an end. It is a major feast of the Church's year when Christians recall how God's Holy Spirit was given to the disciples after Jesus' ascension, empowering them to begin the work of making disciples of all nations



Many people will remember the very successful event held in the Gladstone Village Hall in 2011 which raised some £6,000 for charity. This marvellous sum was due to the kindness and generosity of the donors of the various lots and of course the bidders. This year we hope to do even better! Last time around we had some 50 lots which attracted a host of bidders. The categories included:

Vital ongoing support for people in need ...

Donation Point in St Nicholas' Church Porch



In 2018, Wirral Foodbank supported 15,278 people, a 35% increase on 2017. It is difficult to attribute one specific factor for this increase because there are a variety of reasons.

Wirral Foodbank continues to monitor all requests for food within the Wirral area and in 2018 the main causes of need were the benefit changes and benefit payment delays (e.g. Universal Credit) which accounted for 48% of those helped. A further 13% of people were in debt, 26% were on low incomes and 13% were affected for other reasons.

Last year Wirral Foodbank appointed Nicola Connor as a Benefits Adviser. Many clients who come to the Foodbank for help have intellectual disabilities or mental health problems which often prevents them from accessing help. What these people need is someone who is available on the spot to advise and has a down to earth, approachable manner in addition to specialised knowledge and skills,. That is the service that Nicola is able to provide.

January 2019 saw a 51% increase in the number of people coming to the Foodbank, compared to the same period last year. This has been the experience across the majority of Trussell Trust Foodbanks. February and March were still higher than in 2018 and year to date, there is an overall increase of 23% on the same period last year.

St Nicholas' Church and the local community have supported Wirral Foodbank for many years and your support is more important than ever.

Now may be the ideal time to get yourself fit for purpose ...

A newcomer to Burton or Puddington couldn't fail to be surprised by the richness of the social and sporting life in the villages. Outdoor events on Puddington Green, last year's Pumpkin Festival, trivia nights, social clubs, the upcoming 2019 Festival, not to mention the myriad of opportunities for keeping fit.

In future magazines, we will have occasional articles about ongoing activities you can sample and enjoy. In this issue, we turn the spotlight on Yoga and fitness classes. There are three yoga classes available, each with a slightly different focus. And, there's a 'Couch to 5K Run' class that you can join at any time.

YOGA – 90 MIN SESSION, TUESDAYS AT 7:00PM GLADSTONE VILLAGE HALL

Andrew Collin launched this Hatha Yoga class in September 2017. The lessons, which change each week and provide for mixed abilities are the opposite of hot and sweaty classes available elsewhere. A more considered approach for the mind and body is used. A particular specialty is the guided, prolonged relaxation at the end. Students say that de-stressing is very important – one even stopped grinding her teeth at night! Others may just sleep better. The flexibility and strength developed helps as background to any sport or other activity.

Chair Yoga – 60 min sessions, Mondays & Thursdays at 9:30am Social Club

Andrew found there was a demand for another Yoga form, where students were not required to get up and down off the mat. Specifically, this would help those who wanted to remain as physically active as possible, despite the ageing process or medical conditions. The aims of the session include the opportunity to socialise, to enhance flexibility and strength, as well as to improve balance and self-confidence.

Yoga – 60 min session, Wednesdays at 9:15am. Gladstone Village Hall

Lorraine Coxon launched her Hatha Yoga class in March 2019. The word yoga means 'union', with the ultimate goal of stability, balance and health for the body, mind and spirit. In each lesson there is focus on mindful movement – so observing our bodies with lots of focus on breathing as we move through the asanas (postures) and most of all enjoying ourselves whilst benefitting from a greater sense of overall well-being. The lesson lasts just an hour each Wednesday morning and finishes with a short relaxation to get everyone ready for the day ahead.

COUCH TO 5K RUN - 60 MIN SESSION, MONDAYS 12 NOON & SATURDAYS 9:00AM VERANDAH, TO THE FRONT OF THE SOCIAL CLUB

Andrew introduced these free sessions in April.

The NHS has provided a cautious and sensible blueprint to enable aspiring runners to rise from the sofa and gradually train to run up to a modest 5 kilometres. This initially only requires 20 minutes of mixed walking and slow running, with three sessions per week, rising to 30+ minutes of running, after roughly 9 weeks. Of course, there is a website and an app for that! It's not about speed – it's more about the pleasure and the health benefits of running for life

The group would love more folk to join in. So, feel inspired and supported, whatever your fitness level, from NHS Week 1 to 9 and beyond!

FOOD WASTE WARRIORS WANTED!


The Port Grocery is a Community Food Club based at the Community Cafe of Trinity Methodist Church in Ellesmere Port. It's an initiative that seeks to address the two key issues of 'food waste' and 'food poverty'.

Three years ago, M&S offered to donate food to the cause provided it was collected, and this led to the start of the Wednesday Welcome. A 5-week trial established the needs of the local community. It proved very popular as an extra support to people who were experiencing many different social difficulties including poverty and social isolation. The Wednesday Welcome became a permanent fixture. M&S continued its support, and Tesco, ASDA and Waitrose now also make contributions.

The Wednesday Welcome is from 11.30 am to 1.00 pm every Wednesday and attracts between 200 and 300 people each week. They are served with free food and drinks, including hot food and soup prepared in the kitchen by volunteers. Free food and clothing are also distributed.

Members pay £5 per week to receive £20 to £25 worth of groceries each week. The shop opened in November 2016 and started with 50 members, which has now grown to 600 The scheme is seeking more volunteers to join its 'war on waste'. Summer Spectacles at Burton Mere Wetlands ...

Following superb weather on Easter weekend which, for once landed in the heart of bluebell season to the delight of our many bank holiday visitors, a return to more seasonal weather has not managed to dampen the spirits at the reserve.

Our 40th anniversary year continues to bring wildlife excitement, with a couple of the pairs of bearded tits that set up home in the reedbed in autumn showing signs of nest building, a probable pair of cattle egrets looking likely to repeat their 2017 breeding attempt and, at the time of writing, a single black tern, a scarce continental vagrant, feeding obligingly close to Marsh Covert hide.

Hopefully we will enjoy some consistently warm, sunny days over the summer like last year, with plenty of opportunities to venture outdoors.

The abundant avocet pairs will be closely guarding their chicks from aerial predators, the drama of which can be enjoyed from in the visitor centre with a drink and a fresh sandwich supplied by Little Neston's Village Bakehouse & Deli.

Warmer weather will increase the emergence of much of the non-bird wildlife that calls Burton Mere Wetlands home; butterflies, dragonflies and damselflies will soon decorate the paths and pools with colour, along with the magnificent marsh orchids which thrive across the wet ground, as well as the iconic bee orchids which line the path to the east of the visitor centre.

A short walk along the main nature trail will bring you to the bustling colony of herons and little egrets in the treetops of Marsh Covert woodland, where hopefully the aforementioned, rare cattle egret pair will be raising a chick or two. Further afield, we'll be hoping marsh harriers nest on the estuary for the second time, after last year's successful pair.

The shop trial mentioned in the last newsletter has bedded in well, with a range of products from bird seed, feeders and tables, to binoculars and telescopes on hand to view and try before you buy. If you're interested in upgrading, or getting your first set of binoculars or a 'scope to aid your wildlife watching, we have an Optics Demo event on the weekend of 22-23 June, where you can get expert knowledge and advice on choosing the perfect model for you. All purchases made here support work on the Dee Estuary reserve, so please call in for a browse, you may be surprised at what's on offer.

If you like guided walks we have a Summer Wildlife Wander on Wednesday 17 July, a general relaxing stroll through Burton Mere Wetlands with a knowledgeable guide to point out anything and everything of interest along the way.

IT'S PLANTING TIME AGAIN

It's a busy time of year with all the usual gardening and greenhouse tasks. The greenhouse is packed with seedlings waiting to 'harden off'. Again, germination of the sweet peas has been varied.

The camellias were beautiful, especially a double red and Lady Macon (pale pink). Some rhododendrons are in bloom or are about to bloom, but the long hot spell last year took its toll. The two lilacs are starting to bloom and their perfume is just lovely.

Buff Beauty (apricot coloured rose) is growing on strongly but Rosa Mundi is not progressing very well. A large Ribes (flowering currant) has ceased flowering and will be pruned. The forsythia will also have the same treatment.

The five new Eryngium seedlings have now been transplanted to various parts of the

garden and one in a container. Masses of Aquilegia (Columbine) have appeared, with a few already in bloom.



The pairs of blackbirds

have returned to the garden, also goldfinches and greenfinches, a pair of robins, Jenny Wren and a nuthatch. Great tits have nested in one bird box and blue tits in a box located on a tree awaiting removal (the tree, not the box)!
