Rev. Cathy Helm The Vicar Writes . . .

When I was about 9, I learned a memorable lesson about giving and receiving. I was desperate for a new bike for Christmas. My old bike was far too small and battered and to have a proper size bike was my dream. I went downstairs on Christmas morning and saw a blanket covering a bike shaped present. With great excitement, having had to wait until all the family were together, I pulled back the blanket and there was my big sister's old bike, all shining and done up. I learned that Christmas, that it is not the size of the gift that matters, but the size of the heart that gives it.

Can you imagine being given a gift all beautifully wrapped with a large label showing your name written upon it that said given with great love, the greatest gift I can give?

What would you do with such a gift?

Treasure it, use it for Christmas and then forget about it, put it on a shelf and admire it, or sell it on eBay as so many people do on Boxing day!



I suppose our response could depend on who is giving the gift and perhaps, the size of the heart? Or if we're really cynical, whether the receipt is still in the box!

There's a Christmas Carol that's not in the usual repertoire called 'Love came down at Christmas'.

Could it be that the greatest gift ever given was a tiny baby born in Bethlehem over 2000 years ago?

A heart that longs for that love to be returned, for the gifts given to be enjoyed, used wisely and generously but so much more than this is that;




The gift of God is eternal life through Christ Jesus our Lord.'

on the shelf, to forget about it, to ignore or dismiss it, impoverishes our lives not just for now, but for eternity.






Parents, staff and pupils enjoyed our harvest service in church and our food gifts were donated to Save the Family where we hope they made a valuable difference.

An Illustrated Talk by Professor Mike Bode

The Star of Bethlehem

An Astronomer's View

Thursday 12 December 7.30pm St Nicholas' Church, Burton

Professor Mike Bode is recently retired from the Astrophysics Research Institute of Liverpool John Moores University. He is a church member and also a member of the European Astronomical Society (EAS). Since May 2017 Mike has been the EAS's Special Representative to the European Union.



The Star of Bethlehem, or Christmas Star, appears only in the nativity story of St Matthew's Gospel where 'wise men from the East' (Magi) are inspired by the star to travel to Jerusalem. The star leads them to Jesus' home in the town of Bethlehem, where they worship him and give him gifts.

The story of the Star of Bethlehem is one of the most familiar aspects of a traditional Christmas. If based on real events, scholars have puzzled over the star's physical origin for centuries.

Mike's talk will start with a brief introductory
Tour of the Universe. Mike will survey the
available evidence based on up to date
knowledge and he will assess which, if any,
astronomical phenomena may have given rise to
the biblical accounts. His talk promises to come
to some possibly surprising conclusions!

Winter Wonders ... At Burton Mere Wetlands

After the highs of summer with new breeding birds – bearded tit and great egret, if you had missed the news – along with much hype around our 40th anniversary, the anticipated autumn wader migration was far quieter than hoped. However, as expected, we've had the usual boom in kingfisher sightings, enjoyed the musical movements of pink-footed geese overhead, an ever-growing starling murmuration and the wonderful palette of autumn colour.

As we head into winter, Burton Mere Wetlands' unique visitor centre becomes a prime place to enjoy a range of geese, ducks and swans plus vast flocks of wading birds on a comfy chair, beside a wood stove, with quality refreshments on hand – whatever the weather! A short walk out from the centre immerses you in rich woodland with easy to see winter stars like siskin, goldcrest, bullfinch and the migrant thrushes, redwing and fieldfare.

Birds of prey make regular passes, multiple marsh harriers are virtually part of the furniture and, depending on the severity of the winter, hen harriers and short-eared owls can make a habit of hunting here too. All these and more, roam the saltmarsh and we hold monthly 'Parkgate Raptorwatch' events to showcase these awesome hunters to birdwatchers and passers-by alike. Find us at Parkgate Old Baths on the second Sunday of the month from 1.00pm until dusk.

We recently turned our attention to attracting more young families and tested a new 'Little Explorers' event twice in October, with two more dates set for Monday mornings in December (2 and 16).

What do some of the terms actually mean ...

Advent

Advent is the season of expectation and preparation, as the Christian Church prepares to celebrate the coming (adventus) of Christ.

Christmas

The great feast day that marks the anniversary of Jesus' birth and has inspired the many joyful customs and traditions that Christians use to mark Christmas.

Epiphany

Epiphany, which traditionally falls on 6 January, is a Christian feast day that celebrates the revelation of God the Son as a human being in Jesus Christ. Western Christians commemorate Epiphany as the visit of the Magi (the three wise men) to the Baby Jesus, and thereby Jesus' physical manifestation to the Gentiles (non-Jews).

Find Out What's Been Happening Down the Garden Path ...

As one gardening year ends, another unfolds.

At the time of writing (November), roses continued to bloom, and hydrangea florets filled the vases.

However, before settling the garden for winter, many tasks awaited. On the odd fine days the buddleia were pruned by one-third. The final hard pruning will take place in February.

The tall roses were also cut back and new bulbs were planted in the various tubs and pots. Crocus Dorothy (yellow) was planted in

a shallow tub whilst the King Alfred daffodils were planted in two large blue tubs. Tulips, Queen of the Night (black) and Shirley (cream with a mauve



flush) were planted in tubs and black Violas planted on the top of the pot. Also Red Riding Hood tulips were planted in a smaller pot.

The Viburnum (evergreen variety) continues to flourish and, when the flowers appear, they make a lovely addition to flower arrangements. A pink hydrangea cutting grew on strongly in a pot during the summer and has now been planted in the front garden. Two dark blue lacecap cuttings also continue to flourish, but they will stay in their pots indoors during the winter months.

For the first time, hazelnuts appeared on the Twisted Hazel. Their progress from green to a light brown was constantly noted. However, they have all disappeared. Was it the squirrel? The

green berries on the holly bush



turned a lovely deep red. The birds have eaten every berry on the rowan.

The camellias are already budding and, during the summer, were well watered and had a feed of cold tea from time to time. The dahlias have been wonderful and when the frost blackens the leaves they will be cut down and tubers covered with grass cuttings.

Masses of birds visit the garden, namely

one lone nuthatch, long tailed/great/blue tits, green/goldfinches, Jenny Wren and Robbie Robin.

Now that the darker nights are here it is especially important to review your home security. Nothing advertises the fact that noone is at home more than a house in complete



darkness, particularly if other properties have lights on and vehicles on the driveway.

If you are going out and do not plan to return home until after dark, invest in some timer switches so that lights do come on.

Let your neighbours know if you are going away so that they can keep an eye on your property and maybe even park a car on your driveway. Also, I am always happy to advise about 'Neighbourhood Watch' schemes.
