A few years ago, a friend sent me a link to a short clip on YouTube called 'meChurch'. It was presented in the usual advertisement way with a softspoken voice, encouraging the listener to join a church which is all about satisfying 'me' and my needs. It's a church where those attending expect to get exactly what they want, including their cars waxed during the service! A church which makes 'me' feel good.

St Paul wrote to the Christians in Corinth that:



Christ crucified is a stumbling block to the Jews and foolishness to the Gentiles

[1 Cor. 1: 23]

He knew from personal experience
that following Jesus is not about
comfort and getting what we want,
to fit in with our preferences but it
means following someone who chose
the way of the cross.and dislikes, to even sacrifice our
dreams to enable them to achieve
theirs. Our love for our loved ones
however strong, will always be a p
reflection of the much greater love
Jesus has for us.

Let us fix our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy set before Him chose the cross.

When you love someone, over time you get to know and understand their thoughts, their passions and maybe even start to look like them! (or is that just with dogs?) When we were in Cornwall on holiday wrapped up against storm Dennis, we realised how much we coordinated! Not quite in matching jumpers, but not far off!

When we love someone, we take the time and trouble to listen, to try to understand, to share in their joys and sorrows and at times it means we may lay aside our own preferences, likes and dislikes, to even sacrifice our dreams to enable them to achieve theirs. Our love for our loved ones, however strong, will always be a pale reflection of the much greater love Jesus has for us. At Easter, we can take time to reflect and remember that love costs, love makes demands. If we are to follow Jesus who loves us completely, we choose to follow a king who came to serve, who chose the cross. The words of the wonderful hymn written by Isaac Watts in 1717 come to mind as a heartfelt response.

Use the words of this hymn as a way to prepare for Easter, read it verse by verse and reflect on what living it may mean for us as individuals and as a church as we discover love so amazing.

When I Survey the Wondrous Cross

When I survey the wondrous cross On which the Prince of glory died, My richest gain I count but loss, And pour contempt on all my pride.

Forbid it, Lord, that I should boast, Save in the death of Christ my God! All the vain things that charm me most, I sacrifice them to His blood.

See from His head, His hands, His feet, Sorrow and love flow mingled down! Did e'er such love and sorrow meet, Or thorns compose so rich a crown?

Were the whole realm of nature mine, That were a present far too small; Love so amazing, so divine, Demands my soul, my life, my all.



I wrote my article back in February when life was very different. I did consider changing my article. I then reflected and realised that our dependency upon Jesus who loves us so completely has been brought into even sharper focus as we now get used to being in social distance or isolation. He is our strength, our hope, our courage, our calm in the storm. He understands loneliness, suffering and isolation.

When Paul and Silas were imprisoned and chained to the wall, they were restricted, isolated, at the mercy of forces beyond their control and what did they do? They sang praises to God and worshipped Jesus who knows what it is to be alone.

I've already suggested one hymn to use to reflect upon, but if you were asked, which would be your favourite hymn or song of praise?



Why not go to **YouTube** and listen to it, even sing along? Some versions show the lyrics too! The words of favourite hymns and songs have the amazing ability to lift our spirits, to remind us of great truths of God's love, his faithfulness and his presence with us through these difficult times.

My favourites are *Great is Thy faithfulness, Praise my soul the King of heaven, 10, 000 reasons, In Christ Alone, King of kings, Majesty*I could go on. The nation's top ones for last year were *Jerusalem, Guide me, O Thou great Redeemer* and *Amazing grace.*

As the church building is sadly closed, the church is still very much in business. I am sending out our Sunday services via email each week and you can either email me <u>c.helm@burtonchurch.org.uk</u> to ask to be included or you can find these and other resources on the website.

Why not email me with your favourite hymn if I've not mentioned yours?

Another favourite is based on Psalm 46:

God is our strength

and refuge, an ever present help in trouble.

Dear God,


We're grateful that You never leave or forsake us. And, we're grateful for the technology that helps us stay in touch with each other.


Supporting Our Local Community



Spring is Around the Corner - Despite the Difficulties There's Lots to See Around Us

Curtains of rain one moment, brilliant sunshine the next, gale-force winds and perfectly balmy evenings: the restless weather can only mean one thing; Spring is underway!

It's been a wet start to the year, with the bluster of storms Ciara and Dennis to blow away the cobwebs earlier in February and speed us through March! We've consequently had very high-water levels on the main scrape at RSPB Burton Mere Wetlands and have been astounded by spectacular high tides at Parkgate. The wild wind and water have pushed some magnificent birds of prey onto our reserve, with both male and female hen harriers, marsh harriers and the odd owl or two among the truly special wildlife seen here this year.

On 8-10 April we had planned to have more Tidewatch events at Parkgate, held on the Donkey Stand but these have had to be cancelled due to the Coronavirus restrictions.

Looking out of the panoramic windows in our visitor centre, the changing season has ushered in new faces and feathers. A friendly office sweepstake saw us trying to predict the first avocet back on the reserve, and on 13 February it turned up, right on cue!

This iconic, elegant black and white wader wasn't alone for long, and not just avocets, but lapwings and black-headed gulls in breeding plumage are building nests on the islands across the main scrape.

Two exciting species, the exotic cattle egrets and secretive bearded tits have been spotted throughout the winter, leaving us hopeful for further breeding attempts this spring. Nesting herons and little egrets, as well as our steadily increasing number of great white egrets will be seen precariously perched in the treetops in April. If you haven't seen this odd but endearing feat of natural engineering, you're in for a treat! A couple of spoonbills – unique-billed relatives of the ibises – showed promise last year, so we're hoping to add them to our collection of breeding birds in 2020.

Before we sign off, we'd like to thank you all for your support in making our mail-order shop a success over its first year. We've got our summer range in and can advise you about everything from bird feeders to bamboo cutlery to tea towels! Not to mention, of course, our dazzling array of optics.

Spring's on the Way ...

garden from all those lovely spring flowering

First to show were the snowdrops, namely Galanthus Nivalis, Flore Peno and Elwesii. After flowering the Nivalis will be split from the larger clumps and replanted.



The weeping willow (Kilmarnock) looks wonderful with masses of pussy willows. It was purchased last year from Scotland and has continued to grow on well.

The Buddleja Davidii have been hard pruned to promote new growth this year.

To date the camellias are in various stages of bloom. The white variety is in full bloom as is the Felice Harris (pale pink). Still to bloom are

Lady Macron (double pink) and a new camellia Marie Williams (red).

Daffodils, Tête-à-tête, Rip Van Winkle and Thalia have short stems and can withstand the gales.

The many tubs of tulips are a long way from flowering and their blooms are awaited.

The heathers on the rockery have provided much needed colour to the garden and a purple/white Hebe has also flowered.

The Viburnum is in full bloom at the moment and red Skimmia is still flowering.

The twisted hazel (Harry Lauder's Walking Stick) is again growing out of control and will be pruned back to an acceptable height.

Masses of birds have visited the garden – pairs of blackbirds, blue/great/long-tailed tits, a lone nuthatch, greenfinches, goldfinches and, of



course, our pair of very aggressive robins.

As you may (or may not be aware) B4RN Cheshire is live and running at amazing speeds in Capenhurst, Woodbank and Shotwick – we need it HERE and we want it NOW!!

In order to speed up the process of installing and going live we need to prove there is an overwhelming desire for B4RN in the area, so......

Rural Gigabit Connectivity

Only 7% of homes and businesses across the UK can access 1GB (1000 meg), the Government is wanting this to increase, especially focusing on rural areas. The voucher scheme will provide up to £3,500 for small businesses and £1,500 for residents to the suppliers of Gigabit internet, i.e. B4RN.

If you register and complete the voucher process the Government grant scheme will allocate funding towards B4RN in our area, this in effect reduces the overall amount of local investment needed and allow the project to run in profit at a very early stage.

What you need to do:

- 1. www.b4rn.org.uk
- 2. Get B4RN (top row of icons if on a laptop, within MENU if on a phone)
- 3. Enter your postcode and check availability if it's great news then....
- 4. Scroll down to 'Gigabit Voucher Request Form'
- Complete the form information * if you're a business or self employed please fill out the company information as that receives the most funding*
- 6. Submit

Please note there is no contractual agreement for you to take up the service at this stage, when or if B4RN pass your property will be your opportunity to have a house kit fitted and fibre to your house.

LOCAL POLICE COMMUNITY SUPPORT OFFICER - PCSO

The weather was particularly foul in March, courtesy of all the storms, and yet we received numerous calls about a lady calling door to door, claiming to be deaf and trying to sell paintings to raise money for her family.

Police advise never to let unwanted callers or strangers into your home as they often appear to target vulnerable people.

We also receive numerous reports regarding online scams and phone scams.

Phone Scams

Scammers will call on mobiles or landlines claiming to be your bank or other trusted organisations. They may have some of your details, which they use to convince you that they are legitimate. Your bank will never ask you for your PIN or full online banking password. One technique that scammers use to convince you that they are legitimate is to ask you to call them back to prove that they are the actual organisation. When you hang up, the scammers can keep your line open for 2-3 minutes before it automatically clears. The scammers will then play a dial tone noise so that when you pick up the phone to call the bank, it will seem that you're initiating a new call when, in fact, you're still connected to the scammer. They will then ask you for secure information which they can use to take money from your account. If you ever receive a call purporting to be



from your bank, etc then wait at least 5 minutes before calling back or use a different phone such as a mobile to ensure that the line has been cleared.

Computer Software Service Fraud

This occurs when fraudsters posing as legitimate companies such as Microsoft or your ISP call to tell you that there's a problem with your computer. They'll say something like there's a virus on your computer or there is something wrong with your computer or your router or internet are not performing properly.

They might say that they can fix the problem for a fee, or alternatively they can compensate you for the problem.

What the fraudsters really want is for you to unwittingly grant them remote access to your computer by installing software or visiting a particular website and for you to give them your payment details. Legitimate companies like Microsoft and Google never cold call you and ask for access to your computer or for your financial details. Even if they give you details, never give out personal information during a cold call.

Never grant anyone access to your computer remotely, never go to a website that they give you and never install software because of the call.

SCAM WARNING



Coronavirus-related frauds increase by 400% in March

Between 1st February 2020 and 18th March 2020, Action Fraud has received 105 reports from victims of coronavirus-related frauds, with loses totalling close to £970,000. The majority of the reports are related to online shopping scams where people have ordered protective face masks, hand sanitiser, and other products, which have never arrived. We have also received over 200 reports about coronavirus-themed phishing emails attempting to trick people into opening malicious attachments or revealing sensitive personal and financial information.

Watch out for scam messages:

Don't click on the links or attachments in suspicious emails, and never respond to unsolicited messages and calls that ask for your personal or financial details Shopping online: If you're making a purchase from a company or person you don't know and trust, carry out some research first, and ask a friend or family member for advice before completing the purchase. Where possible, use a credit card to make the payment, as most major oredit card providers insure online purchases.

Protect your devices from the latest threats:

Always install the latest software and app updates to protect your devices from the latest threats.
