In the words of Cher... *if I could turn back time...*What would you wish that you could do differently in 2012?

As we enter another year and say to ourselves...'how did that come around so quickly?' it is so often a time when we look back with joy or regret, hope or dismay, thankfulness or resignation or maybe all at once! We may well wish we could turn back time and try again. But as you look at the year ahead, would your response be 'whatever!'?

Its a little word over used by the character of Lauren played by Catherine Tate and has encouraged a generation to use the put down to great effect. To have someone reply 'whatever' is now a harsh put down showing that they just can't be bothered to be interested in the other person, their feelings, their hopes, their joys or concerns. It's become a word which encapsulates feelings of boredom and indifference and a 'couldn't care less' attitude.

As we slide into another new year, will we continue to go ahead clutching at the old habits and unhelpful attitudes that have tripped us up in the past year or will we take the opportunity to do some soher reflection and make some

positive decisions about how we would like to do life with God in the year ahead...... or will we just say 'whatever!

St Paul had a 'whatever' attitude. However, he used it to much greater effect. He wrote in Philippians 1: 27

'Whatever happens, conduct yourselves in a manner worthy of the gospel of Jesus Christ.'

He also wrote to the Colossians

'whatever you do, do it in the name of Jesus , giving thanks to God the Father through him.'

He was writing to them sat on death row, in prison and had no idea how long he would be there, but his loyalty to Jesus was not dependent on a desired outcome. He didn't say to God.....
'I'll give up on you if you don't get me out of here.....rather he said 'whatever...'

Paul knew he had a very uncertain future but his faith in God wasn't conditional on God doing exactly what he wanted him to do when he wanted it.

Are we ready to trust God with our 'whatever'? We don't know what the year ahead will bring, but we can enter it trusting completely that Jesus will be with us every step of the way if we let him.

Have a wonderful New Year....and may we all stay following Jesus.....whatever.

Fifty Dedicated Years

Sunday 3rd December was the day for a special celebration, being the occasion of Geoffrey Parsons' 50th anniversary of being ordained as a priest. Happily, it was also the day when the Christingle service in the afternoon replaced the normal 10 am service. This made it possible for those who attend the early communion to stay on in church and join Geoffrey, Anne and their family for a chat, for giving Geoffrey their personal congratulations, and for a slice of the large and beautifully decorated anniversary cake which Anne had made.

It was a testament to the affection which we all have for Geoffrey that such a large number attended the service - more people than his years of ministry! That ministry followed his theological training at Ridley Hall, Cambridge; he was ordained by the then bishop of Chester, Gerald Ellison, first as deacon in 1961, and then as priest in 1962. After an initial three year curacy on the far side of Cheshire, he moved to become curate in Heswall. It was there that he met and married the boss' daughter, Anne, which shows what excellent judgement he has!

His boss was of course our much loved late parishioner, Canon Lee, and that was how Geoffrey and Anne came to join our congregation on Geoffrey's retirement. But that is jumping ahead somewhat, as Geoffrey spent a total of 32 years as vicar, first in Congleton, then Weaverham, and finally Backford and Capenhurst.

Although Geoffrey retired from full time duties in 2001, he and Anne between them have been stalwart supporters of many aspects of our parish life, and we are grateful to Geoffrey for willingly stepping in to take services when the need arises. Both Geoffrey and Anne are examples of care and thoughtfulness for others; it is no surprise that so many of us wanted to be there for their celebration of the half-century.

As is well known, Anne is a key member of the church's band of bellringers, and both she and Geoffrey perform with others on the handbells. It was therefore fitting that six of the band, including Anne, rang a quarter peal in Geoffrey's honour, on the evening of his celebration, using the 'method' (the complex sequence of changes) called 'St. Nicholas'.

We all wish Geoffrey and Anne many happy and active years to come.

A New Year unfolds

Any bushes, shrubs and roses were in need of a good hard prune as they had grown so high with such a wet summer. The Holly bush and the Twisted Hazel (Harry Lauder's walking stick) also had a good "haircut". The Hydrangea heads provide some colour in the garden and even when they turn brown they will not be trimmed off until the spring as they protect the buds from frost. The Camellias are covered by lace curtains in the very cold frosty weather and this method does protect the buds and the plant itself.

Masses of various bulbs have been planted both in the gardens and various tubs and pots and hopefully they will provide good colour in the spring. Narcissus Paperwhite Grandiflora bulbs were planted in a pot indoors and they have a lovely strong perfume. Unfortunately they flowered before Christmas. Although the days are shorter and the trees are leafless, they do look lovely against a winter sky.

Many birds frequent the garden in winter. The jay is very shy, but the blue, great and long tailed tits are nearly always present on the bird feeders. Cedric, the pheasant, calls frequently for his three highland shortbread biscuits!

November PCC Meeting

Briefing on 6 November PCC Meeting

a) Church Steps, Paths and New Hand Rail

A key item under matters arising from previous meetings was the need to reconstruct the sandstone steps on the main entrance, to resurface the paths and to install a hand rail on the path from The Rake. The costs were discussed in detail where based on the recommended contractors the total cost is £19,551.00. A grant application had been made to the council's Rural Support Programme for 50% of the costs when a contingency of £1,000 was included to make the total cost £20,551.00. The PCC approved unanimously that a Faculty Application should be made as soon as possible.

Since the PCC meeting we have been advised that our grant application has been unsuccessful, but very fortunately we have received a very generous offer to meet the full costs.

b) Church for the Future

The PCC were briefed on a constructive meeting that Cathy and the Archdeacon the Venerable Dr. Michael Gilbertson had had with Burton Residents' Association when communications were positive with a general recognition that the church needed additional space. Requests were made to re-look at the Vestry extension option and also to consider a building in the woods behind the church. These will be progressed.

A letter has been received from the BRA setting out a suggestion related to a Vestry extension and due to an already busy agenda, the PCC agreed to consider this fully at the next meeting in January. A new committee needs to be formed to take this project forward including the internal works already agreed; these being the installation of a glass door in the Porch, the removal of one part of a pew for wheelchair access and the raising of the floor level in the area behind the choir stalls in front of the Massey Chapel.



Financial Update: Good news from Gift Aid

Bryan Blakeman reported that we have received the tax claim of £14,179 that compares to last year's claim of £11,190 and demonstrates the benefit of people gift aiding their planned giving. The Sound system has now been fully installed and is much appreciated already. We received generous donations amounting to £8000 towards the costs of the sound system and are very thankful to those who enabled this to go ahead.

Growth Action Plans for 2012-13

As a Church our mission statement is that we are 'Growing and thriving with God in the Community.' And with this in mind, the PCC after much discussion at our annual PCC away day and subsequent meeting agreed that our goals for the next year would be largely to consolidate much of the exciting work that has been going on over the last year. Our new goals are therefore:

Goal 1

To continue to develop the Pastoral Care Team and Pastoral Outreach to all age groups.

Goal 2

To continue to build upon the work with children and young families and to start a messy church group.

Goal 3

Continue to look at ways to make the church building fit for purpose for the whole congregation

School trips - Viking and Plessington

At the end we were very thankful as they gave us chocolate, drinks, biscuits and mince pies. We had great fun and I think the residents did too.

Overall we had great fun and would do it all again!


