

From our Vicar

As the season of 'remembering' the outbreak of World War 1 approaches, starting from 4th August when war was declared upon Germany one hundred years ago, I find it difficult and uncomfortable when people talk of celebration rather than commemoration. I do not believe the outbreak of war is something to celebrate rather it is vital that we hear and commemorate the stories again of those who gave so much for our freedom, who sacrificed and knew firsthand the horror of war. The Royal British Legion have been very careful to avoid the use of the word celebrate and are rather putting their emphasis upon remembering the stories of immense courage and sacrifice.

It is in reading some of these stories that I discovered that the Church Army had been very involved in the front lines, with their volunteers and evangelists stepping up to the challenge of serving the practical needs of those serving in the trenches and bringing the hope of faith into places of such fear and horror.

These Church Army volunteers ran 2000 recreation huts and tents, hostels and rest homes, mobile canteens and carried out hospital visiting bringing hope to thousands in their darkest hours of need.

Their huts were places of refuge and open to all, many soldiers came there to write their letters home before facing the trenches as well as attending services and Bible studies. Amongst the mud they became places were the light of Jesus was all that was left to hold onto.

The Church Army continues today and as a church we support financially and through prayer as they serve amongst those who are marginalized and vulnerable, those who face their own 'darkest hour', the homeless, those struggling with addiction or unemployment, the very young and the elderly.

Sadly war has been a feature of human history since records began. World War 1 was supposed to be'the war to end all wars....'. I found this statistic that since 3600BC the world has only known 292 years of peace. There have been 14,351 wars and as the book I found this in was published in 2005... that figure is still increasing! What shines through the darkness of statistics like that are the stories of courage and the example of those who are willing to bring light of Christ and hope into seemingly hopeless situations.

It is in hearing those stories that we can remember them with thankful hearts, but also to strengthen our resolve to work and to pray for peace for future generations. On the evening of August 4th there is to be a candlelit vigil in Westminster Abbey, like me you may not be able to get to London but perhaps a prayer like this may help.

Living God, teach us to truly appreciate the freedom we enjoy and never to forget what it cost for so many. Remind us of the awfulness of conflict,

So that we may strive always for peace.

Awaken us to our part in a broken world

And our responsibility to work for it's healing. Amen



Magazine round-up - and appeal!

What a busy couple of months it has been in our Parish! With the Festival of Flowers and Village Fete, as well as events at Burton Manor, the RSPB Wildlife Sanctuary and the Open Garden Scheme, plus a lively "Messy Church" there has been a lot of activity going on around us!

This issue of the magazine has "reports" from some of our more junior readers about events that have occurred in their lives - from television interviews to representing the local school in sporting galas, opening the village fete and partaking in the Messy Church, we don't know how they do it all!

However as the Remembrance events from both World Wars start it is sometimes difficult for the younger generation to understand the sacrifices that have been made by past generations. Indeed the local Guide Troop of which I am a trainee Leader recently had to compile a menu based on food rations - imagine their shock when they realised there was no ready meals, sweets or chocolate, the fruit had to be seasonal and home grown (so no bananas, grapes or oranges!) and that they had only one egg per week. Powdered egg was greeted with howls of disgust and the recipes for "Woolton Pie" and "the national loaf" were looked at with disbelief!

I have started doing some research into the men whose names we read out every Remembrance Sunday - fourteen from the Great War and a further eleven from World War II. The youngest from First World War died aged just 19 in Flanders, the eldest was just 40. Indeed local man Corporal H H Mellor, who died in World War 1 is buried within the grounds of Burton Church. He served with the Royal Engineers and lost his life on 4th March 1919. In my research I discovered that the Royal Engineers did enormous groundwork in preparation for the Battle of Arras, constructing tunnels for the troops to travel underground. It is reported that in one section of these tunnels the Royal Engineers had over 2,000 men working eighteen hour shifts around the clock for months to complete these tunnels.

We are hopeful of finding more War memories of both wars from the past and current residents of Burton in order that they are not forgotten - and can be taught to the younger generation. The aim is to get as many memories as we can for a "Memorial Wall" either at the Church or the school. If you have stories or experiences that you feel able to share we would love to hear from you.

A Recipe From The Good Book

Author unknown

Do you know what the following ingredients are without having to check up on the biblical references? If you do need to check them it may be advisable to look at more than one translation as not all of them translate the same.

The ingredients.

- 1. ½lb Judges V verse 25
- 2. ½lb Jeremiah VI verse 20
- 3. 1 tablespoon I Samuel XIV verse 25
- 4. 3 of Jeremiah XVII verse 11
- 5. ½lb Samuel XXX verse 12
- 6. ½lb Nahum III verse 12 (chopped)
- 2oz Numbers XVII verse 8 blanched and chopped
- 8. 1lb I Kings IV verse 22
- 9. Season with 2 Chronicles IX verse 9
- 10. A pinch of Leviticus II verse 13
- 11. A teaspoonful of Amos IV verse 5
- 12. 3 tablespoons of Judges IV verse 19

(Note. Leaven probably means baking powder)

Method.

- Beat 1, 2 and 3 to a cream.
- Add 4 one at a time still beating.
- Then add 5, 6 and 7 and beat again.
- Add 8, 9, 10 and 11 having previously mixed them.
- Then add 12.
- Bake in a low oven for 1½ hours.

Amazing Grace, how sweet the sound, That saved a wretch like me. I once was lost but now am found, Was blind, but now I see.

John Newton crammed a lot of living into his 82 years. His mother died when he was six years old, and he joined his father at sea when he was eleven. He served his apprenticeship as a sailor, and rose through the ranks until he became the captain of a slave ship. He abandoned the religious training that he had experienced as a child, and reveled in the dissolute life of a slave trader. He was noted for his profanity and his cruelty, and was even known as 'The Great Blasphemer'.

But one stormy night off the coast of Donegal, when his ship had been holed and was in danger of sinking, and he was in danger of drowning, Newton had a real change of heart. Newton called out to God as the ship filled with water. After he called out, the cargo flowed out and stopped up the hole, and the ship was able to drift to safety. It might have been his religious training at his mother's knee surfacing after all those years — or it might have been his love for Mary Catlett, a Christian woman whom he later married — or it might have been his reading of the book, Imitation of Christ, by William Law — or it might

have been all three. In any event, Newton had a real conversion experience. However, as he was to admit later, "I cannot consider myself to have been a believer, in the full sense of the word."

For a while, Newton continued on his slave ship, but he began to treat both the slaves and his crew with a good deal more compassion. Finally, convinced that the slave trade was wrong, he left his ship and took a job onshore.

He then felt a call to the ministry, and was ordained at age forty and assigned to a church at Olney, Buckinghamshire. Newton wrote many hymns, including How Sweet the Name of Jesus Sounds and Glorious Things of Thee are Spoken, but he is best remembered for Amazing Grace, which is in a sense Newton's own story. It was amazing grace that saved him, and it was amazing grace that was the focus of his preaching.

He continued in ministry through the rest of his long life, even after failing eyesight made it impossible for him to read. Newton never ceased to be amazed by God's grace and, nearing the end of his life, told his friends, "My memory is nearly gone; but I remember two things: That I am a great sinner, and that Christ is a great Saviour."

Please give the show your support, either as a competitor, or come along in the afternoon to see what others can produce and make the day a success.



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
