

## From our Vicar

Some questions are harder to answer than others such as why do they wake you up in hospital to take a sleeping tablet or why isn't phonics spelt as it sounds?

Some questions have been asked since the being of time such as 'is there really a God?' or 'Why does believing have to be so hard?' Or ' why does God allow suffering?'

During Lent this year we will be providing the opportunity to explore and question and to share perhaps some of our own doubts and questions. There's no guarantee they will all be answered but perhaps we can help each other along the journey of faith rather than think we're all alone in our uncertainties.

The Scottish comedian Billy Connelly is open about his views 'I've absolutely no idea if God exists. It seems unlikely to me, but then does a trout know that I exist?' and TV presenter and Private Eye editor Ian Hislop admits 'I've tried atheism and I can't stick at it; I keep having doubts. That probably sums up my position.'

For so many people, there's the 'I'm not quite sure' dilemma and yet not wanting to completely rule out that God does exist.

There's a polish proverb which says 'To believe with certainty, we must begin with doubting' And

writer Lillian Smith believes that 'Faith and doubt are both needed - not as antagonists, but working side by side to take us around the unknown curve.'

Sometimes perhaps the best that we can say is like the man whose son suffered from convulsions [you can read his story in Mark's gospel chapter 9], as he turned to Jesus and said ' I do believe, help my unbelief!'

Joining a Lent group will be a really good opportunity to raise these questions and to see if in Jesus we can find some answers. Jesus was always gentle in his response to those who doubted him but he also rejoiced when he met with faith. Living with the assurance of God's love is not just for the very young or old but for all people. Thomas Nagel a Professor of philosophy wrote 'I want atheism to be true and am made uneasy by the fact that some of the most intelligent and well informed people I know are religious believers.'

Even if you've never been t o group before, come and join us and take the opportunity to ask some questions.

Thank you to all who have responded to the requests for volunteers to fill different roles within the church.



# Spring Time

This is such a beautiful time of the year with new growth everywhere. The Galanthus Novalis/Elwesii are in full bloom as well as wonderful Winter Aconites with their pretty yellow flowers and rosettes of leaves. Harry Lauder (Twisted Hazel) is producing some stunning catkins which look very good in flower arrangements. The Camellias (four) were very late coming into bloom, the first to produce flowers being a double white unnamed variety. Felic Harris and Lady Macon are both pale pink, but the latter is very slow at flowering, which perhaps means that she is in the wrong position in the garden.

The greenhouse was thoroughly cleaned before the onset of winter, but requires a little spring clean. The pots for the sweet pea seeds do not need to be washed as they are contained in "tights" and keep clean. They are to be filled with seed and cutting compost prior to planting so that the compost is "warmed". They will be sown on 16 March. Other seeds will be sown a little later namely: Pansy, Larkspur, Aster and Fragrance mix.

Many varieties of birds have been in the garden i.e. Blue, Great and long tailed tots, robin, blackbirds, one fieldfare and a tiny goldcrest. The robin has been a constant companion when I have snatched the odd minute in the garden.


